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Executive Summary

The following annual report details the SERC Fiscal Year 2010 (July 1, 2009 – June 30, 2010) activities in support of the federal "Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act (SARA) of 1986," Title III "Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act" (EPCRA) and Title 16, Chapter 63 of the Delaware Code. The aid and assistance of the business community, emergency responders, planners, county commissioners and state agency personnel has been instrumental in developing and maintaining Delaware's hazardous materials emergency preparedness.

SARA Title III and Title 16, Chapter 63

On October 17, 1986, President Reagan signed the Superfund Amendment and Reauthorization Act (SARA) into law. Title III of this Act (which is referred to separately as EPCRA) establishes requirements for Federal, State and local governments, and industry regarding emergency planning and community right-to-know reporting on hazardous chemicals. This legislation builds upon the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) Chemical Emergency Preparedness Program and numerous state and local programs aimed at helping communities to meet their responsibilities concerning potential chemical emergencies.

The Act requires the governor of each state to designate a State Emergency Response Commission (SERC). On March 17, 1987, the Commission on Hazardous Materials was designated as the Delaware State Emergency Response Commission. Members of the SERC are listed in Attachment 6.

The Act has four major sections: emergency planning, emergency notification, hazardous chemical inventory reporting, and toxic chemical release reporting. The sections are interrelated in a way that unifies the emergency planning and community right-to-know provisions of SARA and Title III. An explanation of these sections follows.

1. Emergency Planning

The emergency planning sections are designed to develop state and local government emergency preparedness and response capabilities through better coordination and planning, especially at the local level.

The Act requires the establishment of Local Emergency Planning Districts and Committees. Four (4) Local Emergency Planning Districts and Committees (LEPCs) exist in Delaware and are designated as three (3) counties and the City of Wilmington.

LEPC membership includes elected county and municipal officials, police, fire, civil defense, public health professionals, environmental, hospital, and transportation officials as well as representatives of facilities, community groups, and the media.

A list of the LEPC Chairs, membership, and a summary of their Committee's activities are found at Attachment 3.

The Act also requires the LEPCs to develop hazardous materials emergency response plans. In developing a plan, the local committees evaluate available resources for preparing for and responding to a potential accident involving hazardous materials at the various sites within their jurisdiction.

The SERC is required to review the LEPC plans and make recommendations to the LEPCs on revisions that may be necessary. The SERC fulfilled this mandate and approved all plans for operational use by the LEPCs at its April 1993 meeting. In addition, a biannual review schedule of the LEPC plans was adopted.

2. Emergency Notification

If a facility produces, uses, or stores one or more EPA-listed hazardous substances and there is a release that equals or exceeds the reportable quantity, the facility must immediately notify the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control (DNREC), the SERC, and the Community Emergency Coordinator (CEC). The notification must identify any area likely to be affected by the release.

In the Delaware Code, notification to DNREC serves as notification to the SERC. Previously, notification to the 911 Centers served as notification to the CEC. With legislation passed in 2003, however, this was changed. Notification to the CECs for the LEPCs is now fulfilled by notification to an "800" number established in 2004.

3. Hazardous Chemical Inventory Reporting

There are two Community Right-to-Know reporting obligations under the requirement:

- Facilities must prepare or have available material safety data sheets (MSDSs) under the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) hazard communications regulations and Delaware Worker Right-to-Know requirements. For chemicals on-site above certain quantities, facilities shall submit either copies of the MSDSs or a list of such substances to the SERC, the LEPC, and the local fire company that provides fire rescue service to the facility. In Delaware, these MSDSs or lists are centrally collected and distributed for the SERC through DNREC.
- ➤ Chemical inventory forms must also be submitted annually by March 1 for the preceding calendar year. The form contains chemical type, quantities, storage locations, and emergency contact information.

A Delaware Emergency and Hazardous Chemical Inventory form is used for industry's reporting purposes by the SERC Information and Technology Committee to improve facility reporting.

The form requires additional reporting elements that will further aid the first responder, community, and LEPCs. Completed forms are submitted to DNREC, Division of Air and Waste Management (DAWM), where the information is entered into a database and made available to the LEPCs, 911 Centers, and other approved users for their purposes.

Beginning with reports due March 1, 2006, a new on-line Web-based reporting system was implemented, Tier II Manager. This system allows facilities to register and report on-line through a secure web-site. Submitted data is immediately available on-line for access by approved emergency planning and response organizations. The system also allows facilities to pay reporting fees electronically on-line.

Between January and August 2010, approximately 1801 facilities reported on chemicals used/stored on site. Of these, 1770 (approximately 98%) reported on-line. Information for the remaining facilities, which reported on paper forms, was entered into the on-line system for direct access by emergency planning and response organizations.

4. Toxic Chemical Release Reporting

This section of the act requires EPA to establish an inventory of toxic chemical emissions from certain facilities. The purpose is to inform government officials and the public about releases of toxic chemicals into the environment. It also provides for assistance with research and in the development of regulations, guidelines, and standards.

The reporting requirement applies to owners and operators of manufacturing facilities that have ten or more full-time employees that are in Standard Industrial Classification (SIC) codes 20 through 39, and that manufacture, process, import 25,000 lbs., or otherwise use 10,000 lbs. of a listed toxic chemical. Subject facilities must report these emissions annually by July 1 for the preceding calendar year. Beginning with the 1998 reports due in 1999, seven additional industry categories were also added, including electric generation and bulk petroleum distribution facilities. Beginning with the 2000 calendar year reports due in 2001, substantially lower reporting thresholds were established for a number of chemicals classified as persistent, bio accumulative toxic (PBT) chemicals. The Federal Form R, Toxic Chemical Release Inventory (TRI) Reporting Form is used. Copies are submitted to EPA and State.

For a number of years, EPA has made software available for facilities to compile their TRI reports on computer, and submit their reports on diskette. Beginning in 2006, Delaware implemented a process involving TRI reporting to EPA's Central Data Exchange (CDX). Rather than submitting disks, this process allows facilities to submit their electronic reports through the internet to EPA. EPA in turn pushes a copy of the submittal to the State, to its Exchange Network Node. With this streamlined approach, facilities only need to submit reports once to EPA. Delaware then automatically receives the reports, instead of requiring the facility to submit their reports separately to the EPA and to the state.

Although these reports are not emergency oriented, the data submitted is vital to analysis of situations and supports release prevention.

In Delaware, TRI submissions are directed to DNREC, Division of Air and Waste Management (DAWM). DNREC typically develops and releases an annual report for the public summarizing this TRI data. DNREC's Division of Air and Waste Management also processes public requests for facility information. The majority of the requests were for TRI data.

Other sections of this law provide for confidentiality of trade secrets and public access to all reported information from facilities and emergency response plans.

Facilities

The Federal Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA) was passed by the United States Congress in 1986. In 1991, the State of Delaware passed its own Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act, which built upon the federal requirements and created a funding mechanism for emergency planning activities. These laws established a series of reporting requirements impacting facilities ranging from large industrial sites to small businesses. Facilities can be required to report a variety of information, ranging from chemicals used and stored at the site, to chemicals released to the environment.

Exercises

An exercise program to review the capability of the staff and emergency response personnel to respond to hazardous material incidents continued. Hazardous material events are a regular part of natural and technological hazards exercise scenarios. Policy, training, and outreach efforts continue to expand in this area.

Training

The State of Delaware Oil and Hazardous Substance Incident Contingency Plan (SERT Plan) was developed to establish policy and emergency response organization for responding to a broad class of hazardous substance incidents. Safe and coordinated response requires the application of specialized techniques and organizational concepts. In general, individual organizations are responsible for tactical training in accordance with the assigned roles in the emergency organization. A state program has been developed to educate and train local and state response personnel. The program is administered by the Fire School and is structured to provide training in accordance with assigned roles in the emergency organization. All SERT responders receive Incident Management System Training.

Hazardous Material Decontamination Response Capability

Delaware has three Hazardous Material Decontamination Response Teams. The teams are made up of a combination of agencies: Delaware's Department of Natural Resources, Volunteer/Career Fire Companies and EMS. All of the response teams are provided with the training and equipment necessary to provide specialized HazMat decontamination response to locations throughout the State. Each team is equipped with a state of the art decon trailer and tow vehicle, which contains specialized equipment for decontamination and containment.

New Castle County has an Industrial Hazardous Material Response Alliance (NCC-IHMRA), which was formed in cooperation with the County and local industry HazMat response teams. The Alliance consist of approximately 60 volunteers; mostly industry experts, but some members are sponsored by local fire departments.

Revenues

The Commission collected a net of approximately \$288,620 in reporting fees in the spring of 2010. Monies in the fund and the interest accrued are appropriated annually. The fiscal year 2010 financial status is reflected in Attachment 5.

Operation and Administration of the Commission

The Delaware SERC instituted bylaws to improve its operation. Regularly scheduled meetings and the establishment of standing committees are some highlights of the bylaws adopted by the Commission. The Standing Committees' members, functions, accomplishments, and goals, are contained in Attachment 2.

Outreach and Public Education

An Internet web site developed through a joint effort of SERC Committees established a complete set of Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know web pages for Delaware. The pages provide SERC, LEPC, and Facility Compliance Information to visitors and details the reporting requirements of the Act. The public information section contains a searchable on-line database of TRI data reported by facilities.

Following the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, the Tier II searchable database was removed for security considerations. However, the information is still available, as required by EPCRA. Request for Tier II data can be made using the "on-line" request form or through the Freedom of Information Act request process.

During FY 06, the EPCRA web pages for Delaware were converted to a new "common look and feel" format required for all Delaware government related sites. http://www.serc.delaware.gov/
The pages were also moved from their previous location at the Department of Technology and Information, to a server at the Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control.

At the December 2008 meeting the SERC adopted formal procedures for handling public access to EPCRA information.

Conclusion

Delaware's Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act continues to work well through the dedicated efforts of the partnership of citizens, industry, and the public sector. The Acts implementation provides for the public safety and public awareness about chemicals in their community. The accomplishments of the SERC are in Attachment 1.

Attachment 1

SERC Activities July 2009 - June 2010

- ➤ The Commission met on quarterly scheduled meeting dates in September, December, March, and June. Business was conducted to support the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA). Meetings included:
 - ➤ Reports from the four Standing Committees, which included updates on activities and items requiring action by the Commission.
 - ➤ Reports from the four LEPCs included updates on five key areas: Meetings, Facility Visits, HazMat Plans, Exercise Status, and HazMat Responses.
 - ➤ Briefings from the DNREC/Division of Air Waste Management, which included detailed information on releases and responses. The Commission also received a briefing on the follow-up investigation of the Dow-Reichhold styrene release. The investigation involved three components and multiple programs within the agency to include Environmental Impact and Clean-up, Enforcement, and Prevention.
- > Presentations on the following topics/agencies:
 - ➤ U.S Chemical Safety Board (CSB) video entitled Emergency Preparedness Findings from CSB Accident Investigations. The video included information from ten years of investigations and stressed three key areas, Training, Communications, and Community Planning.
 - ➤ Transportation Community Awareness and Emergency Response (TRANSCAER), following a suggestion by George Giles, Wilmington LEPC, this briefing was added to the SERC agenda. Mr. Giles was not able to attend the meeting because of flooding in the City of Wilmington, therefore, Catherine Pomerantz, FEMA Region III, briefed on the TRANSCAER program and the possibility of Delaware's involvement. The presentation was well received and it was suggested that the Planning and Training Committee explore the possibility of participating.
 - Delaware Hazardous Materials Response DVD the recently released DVD was shown to attendees and was enjoyed by all. The video was the vision of the New Castle County LEPC and included assistance, input and participation from planners and responders statewide. The video briefly addresses the history of EPCRA and depicts, in detail, a simulated HazMat response in Delaware to include the State Emergency Response Team (SERT) Levels and associated responsibilities and actions. Mr. Paul presented a plaque and recognized Mr. Bill McCracken, recently retired Planner for the NCC LEPC, for his coordination and production of the video.
- ➤ Planned and conducted a SERC Retreat that included three Panel discussions on the SERC History, Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA), and Transportation. The Retreat concluded with a discussion on the Strategic Goals and issues that may impact the future of the SERC and LEPCs. - Fully funded LEPCs and other agencies for carrying out responsibilities under the Emergency Planning and Community Right-To-Know Act.
- Funded DNREC and Delaware State Fire School hazardous material training with Hazardous Material Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grant funds.

- Continued to maintain a publicly accessible SERC web page running on Department of Natural Resources and Environmental Control server to make EPCRA information available to the public. Due to security concerns and the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), detailed information reported by facilities is no longer available on the website. Request for this information must be made in writing and be as specific as possible following FOIA procedures. - ➤ Continued to support the Decontamination Trailer Committee by replenishing the Maintenance and Equipment Account.
- ➤ Reviewed the allocations of Hazardous Material Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) Grant Budget projections for approved and pending Planning and Training funds.
- ➤ Hazardous Material Emergency Preparedness (HMEP) funds were sub-granted to the four Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPC) for the second time since the grant started.

Accomplishments for FY 2010

- ➤ Planned a SERC Retreat that included three Panel discussions on the SERC History, Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act (EPCRA), and Transportation.
 - ➤ The History Panel included four SERC members, three past and one current, who answered questions and discussed the evolution of hazardous material response efforts in Delaware to include the Commission on Hazardous Material, precursor to the SERC, New Castle County Hazardous Material Advisory Council, the SERC, and the four Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPC): New Castle, Kent, and Sussex Counties, and the City of Wilmington.
 - The EPCRA Panel included Michelle Price-Fay, Environmental Protection Agency-Region III, and Pam Meitner, DuPont-retired, and former longstanding member of the SERC. They provide a Federal and Industry perspective and discussed the roles, responsibilities, and future expectations of the SERC.

- ➤ The Transportation Panel included members from various modes of transportation to include: Norfolk Southern and Amtrak Rail, United States Department of Transportation, Chesapeake Utilities, and SERC members representing Air and Water Transportation.
- ➤ The Retreat concluded with a discussion on the Strategic Goals and issues that may impact the future of the SERC and LEPCs. Attendees enjoyed the Retreat and there were several appreciative comments and favorable acknowledgements.

New Castle County LEPC

Accomplishments for FY 2010

- > Seven LEPC meetings were conducted:
 - July 13, 2009 –hosted by AstraZeneca (Newark)
 - September 14, 2009 –hosted by Delmarva Power
 - November 9, 2009 hosted by Ashland (Hercules) Research Center
 - January 11, 2010 hosted by DuPont Edge Moor Site
 - March 8, 2010 hosted by AstraZeneca (Wilmington)
 - April 15, 2010 special meeting hosted by DuPont Edge Moor Site
 - May 10, 2010 hosted by Sunoco
- ➤ Sponsored and led efforts to develop and complete a Delaware Hazardous Material Response video. The project represents a partnership between the LEPCs, DSFS, DTCC, state and local government. The purpose of the nineteen-minute training video is to educate and increase awareness of the coordinated efforts of the Delaware Emergency Response System. It describes the SARA and EPCRA federal regulations, role and responsibilities of the SERC, SERT member agencies, the three SERT levels including a federal response as well as describing the DENS emergency notification system.
- ➤ Led efforts to develop a "Resident Awareness & Emergency Preparedness Guide". The guideline represents a partnership between industry, hospital and local government. Totally funded by LEPC member organizations a total of 150,000 copies were printed. A grassroots effort to distribute the guideline to residents of New Castle County is ongoing.
- ➤ LEPC, DSFS and DEMA sponsored the 3rd Annual Hazardous Materials Conference. The Workshops were the Bottoms-Up Rollover Trailer, Electronic Size-up: Making Meters Work for the Responders, Street Smart HazMat Responses, HazMat in Las Vegas, Highway Cargo Tanks Damage Assessment & Emergency Response Consideration, Intermodal Containers, Sunoco Ethylene Fire, Homemade Explosives, 31st Civil Support Team Mission and Capabilities, Gazing into Your Crystal Ball, Review of Tank Car Nomenclature, EMS Review: Protocols & Practicals, Ammonia Response and Product Removal Techniques for Tank Cars.
- ➤ LEPC and the Mill Creek Fire Department sponsored a Functional Exercise on August 22, 2009 to simulate a train derailment carrying hazardous materials alongside Delaware Park. The exercise objectives were:
 - Ensure the safety of citizens and response personnel
 - > Determine exclusion and support zones.
 - Ensure adequate water supply by developing a thorough resource plan
 - ➤ Determine evacuation vs. shelter-in-place procedures
 - ➤ Implement a Site Safety Plan

- > Implement an EMS Plan
- ➤ Provide effective Animal Health Emergency Support for horses

The exercise was an overwhelming success

- ➤ Conducted outreach programs for the Five Points, Millcreek fire companies and Colonial Heights/Lancaster Village Civic Association. Provided outreach material for the St. Francis Hospital Safety & Health Fair, Fuji Film, NCC Rotary Club, Christiana Hospital and Normandy Manor Civic Association. Participated in the DuPont Experimental Station Health and Safety Fair. Continue to participate in all DuPont Edge Moor, FMC and Croda CAP meetings. Developed and presented a two-hour LEPC instructional course to an undergraduate class at Goldey Beacon College.
- ➤ The LEPC arranged for NCCIHMRA training in the following:
 - > Fundamental and Intermediate Concepts of Radiological Response
 - > HazMat Incident Response to Bombing
 - Cosponsored with DEMA a two day HazMat Technician Skills Workshop
- ➤ The on site assessment program continues. During this fiscal year, we have completed 2 on site assessments. The partnership with the Accidental Release Prevention Office of DNREC continues to grow. We have participated in visits, follow-ups and incident investigations.
- ➤ The Hazardous Substance Response Plan for New Castle County was reviewed and updated in April 2010. It will continue to serve as an annex to the New Castle County Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan.
- ➤ Conducted the "Shelter-in-Place" training module for the New Castle County Citizens Emergency Response Team (CERT) December 2009, March and April 2010 classes.
- > Prepared a Report on EHS Facilities in New Castle County for the University of Salisbury Hazard Mitigation Plans.
- ➤ Attended the U.S. Federal Bureau of Investigation's Regional National Improvised Explosive Familiarization Training Seminar on September 17th at Dover AFB.
- Two LEPC/NCCIHMRA representatives attended the Homeland Security sponsored Incident Response to Terrorist Bombings course and achieved certification as a course instructor.
- > Updated, revised and approved LEPC by-laws.
- ➤ Attended the Buffer Zone Protection Program Workshop for the Department of Homeland Security.
- ➤ Risk Management Plan (RMP) company risk zones have been plotted on the digitized maps in Tier II Manager.
- Continue to ensure the Chief of each fire district is informed of the facilities in their district that handle Extremely Hazardous Substances (EHS) and provided a list of those chemicals.

- > Continue to ensure ADC map coordinates are plotted for each facility in Tier II Manager.
- > LEPC staff participated in SERC Information Technology and Planning Committee meetings.
- ➤ LEPC and DEMA sponsored a HazMat Conference banquet with keynote speaker Mr. Michael Callan.

Kent County LEPC

The Kent County LEPC normally meets the second Tuesday of every odd-numbered month at 10:00 a.m. in the Kent County Public Safety Building. Special programs/events may dictate changing the time and/or location of the meetings. The LEPC consists of over 65 members who represent about 50 plus organizations or facilities in the County. The average attendance at the six meetings was 21 members. All 13 categories of members listed in our By-Laws are represented.

The Kent County Department of Public Safety Chief Colin Faulkner serves as Chairman of the LEPC and Special Operations Officer Lt. David Mick serves as Co-chair. Lt. Mick serves on the Planning and Training Committee of SERC. He also serves as the Co-Chairman of the Decon Trailer User's Group Committee. Both Ch. Faulkner and Lt. Mick participate in the Delmarva Emergency Task Force.

Accomplishments for FY 2010

- ➤ Developed an Annual Work Plan and Budget for FY 2011.
- ➤ Supported the long-term LEPC Planning Committee.
- ➤ The Kent County LEPC addressed all nine of the "Uniform LEPC Performance Measures" during Fiscal year 2010.
- ➤ Reviewed the Kent County Emergency Operations Plan for any needed revisions.
- > Supported and assisted with the training on the Decon trailer, including the local fire companies.
- ➤ Held bi-monthly LEPC meetings.
- ➤ Continued support of the Tier II Manager reporting system.
- ➤ The Kent County Emergency Operation Center (EOC) participated with a partial activation for both a radiological rehearsal and federally graded exercise simulating a radiological release from Salem Hope Creek Nuclear Power facility. There were no deficiencies reported for Kent County from either exercise.
- > The Kent County Emergency Operation Center (EOC) was activated for two winter snowstorm events.
- Members of the LEPC participated in three exercises during the year.
- > Provided programs at 6 of the LEPC meetings.
- ➤ Promoted the LEPC at public events/open houses.

- ➤ Worked with facilities in Kent County to identify hazardous and extremely hazardous substances and insure they are meeting reporting requirements.
- Assisted first responders and facilities in pre-planning, drills, and facility compliance.
- ➤ Promoted the Delaware Emergency Notification System to be used in the case of accidental releases at chemical facilities or other emergencies.

- ➤ Continue to support the Tier II Manager reporting system.
- ➤ Continue work with the facilities in Kent County to identify hazardous and extremely hazardous substances and insure they are meeting reporting requirements.
- ➤ Begin a second review of emergency response plans for selected Kent County facilities that maintain an inventory of hazardous and extremely hazardous substances.
- Assist first responders and facilities in pre-planning, drills, and facility compliance.
- ➤ Hold bi-monthly LEPC meetings with a program for each meeting.
- ➤ Meet the performance measures established by SERC for LEPC's.
- Review and update, as needed, the Kent County Emergency Operations Plan.
- Attend SERC meetings and give activity reports for the Kent County LEPC.
- ➤ Attend conferences and training programs to become more knowledgeable in the areas of responsibility for LEPC's.
- ➤ Promote the Delaware Emergency Notification System to be used in the case of accidental releases at chemical facilities or other emergencies.
- > Continue to support Decon 3 and serve as Co-Chairman of the Statewide Decon Committee.
- Participate in investigations by DNREC or the EPA when called upon.
- ➤ Participate in planning and completing tabletop, functional and full-scale exercises in Kent County in accordance with the Statewide Homeland Security Exercise Plan.
- ➤ Identify, publicize, and promote opportunities for improvement in emergency responses to hazardous situations in Kent County.

DNREC Emergency Response State Fiscal Year 2010 Summary of Activities

Statistics for state fiscal year (SFY) 2010 show DNREC's Emergency Response Team (ERT) responded to 306 incidents. This is compared to 302 responses in SFY 2009. SFY 2010 showed a slight increase for the first time in three years in the total number of responses. As with previous years, DNREC's highest percentage of responses continue to be transportation related spills and releases primarily from motor vehicle accidents. The second highest responses were to residential heating fuel spills.

The DNREC Emergency Response Team provided the Hazardous Materials support function as part of a "joint hazard assessment team" with other emergency response and law enforcement agencies during the September 2009 and May 2010 multi-day NASCAR race events at Dover International Speedway. DNREC ERT provided support to three several other large scale multi-hazard events including, the September 2009 return of the National Guard 261st Signal Brigade ceremony and the Biden visit to the former General Motors and proposed Fisker facility, the January 2010 funeral of Mrs. Jean Biden, and the May 2010 Police Memorial dedication in Dover.

The DNREC ERT participated in several drills and exercises with its local, state and federal response partners including, Beebe Medical Center community-wide exercise evaluating the Medical Centers' decontamination capabilities, Dover Air Force Base jet-A fuel spill Full Scale Exercise, and the United States Coast Guard oil spill exercise at the Conoco Phillips refinery in Trainer, PA.

Noteworthy oil and hazardous materials responses during SFY 2010 included:

- Emergency removal of buried drums behind the Blue Hen Corporate Center in Dover. A total of 58, 55-gallon drums were uncovered and removed from the site.
- Coastal storm damage assessment in Sussex County.
- Chemical fires at Ciba in Newport and at Honeywell in Claymont where there was a large fire service response to each fire including the New Castle County Decon unit.
- Submerged vehicle in Massey's Ditch.
- Mixed-load tractor trailer accident at I-95 and I-295 with leaking drums.



However, the Sussex LEPC was going through a re-building phase. They did not have an LEPC staff person, but were planning to hire. The SERC approved funding for the Sussex County LEPC for FY 2009, but the LEPC was to hire for their position first, and then submit a revised budget to cover the balance of the Fiscal Year. Funding was to be provided to Sussex County for FY 2009 once the final, adjusted budget request was received. Sussex County hired an LEPC staff person part way through the Fiscal Year, but did not submit a revised budget request. A retroactive request for FY 2009, documenting actual expenditures, was submitted in December 2009 and funds disbursed in January 2010.
- b) Reports and fees from facilities covering calendar year 2009 were due (to be postmarked) by 3/1/10. A small amount of additional fees are expected as we continue to follow up on delinquent reporters. Net fees received in 2009 totaled \$305,120.
- c) Reimbursements will be necessary to a small number of facilities for reporting errors. These are typically mailed to facilities later in the year. Reimbursements in 2009 totaled \$400.
