





**ROBERT L. GRAHAM - NANTICOKE WILDLIFE AREA
REGULATIONS PERTAINING TO THE MULTIPLE USE TRAIL**

This map shows the location of the Multiple Use Trails and roads open to horse riding on the Area. Horse-riding is permitted on all roads open to vehicular traffic on State Wildlife Areas. Designated trails are laid out to **avoid**: 1) **habitats critical to** the perpetuation of several known species of **rare and endangered plants** (e.g., *box huckleberry*, *wild lupine*) and animals (e.g., *frosted elfin*, *Hessel's hairstreak*, *mud salamander*, *Delmarva Fox Squirrels*), 2) **dove hunting fields**, 3) **deer stands**, and 4) **wildlife food and cover plots**.

***As of July 1, 2017, a Conservation Access Pass (CAP) is required for any registered motor vehicle used to access designated public lands owned or managed by the Division of Fish & Wildlife. For more information go to www.de.gov/fw or call (302)739-9912.**

It is hoped that these regulations will protect the natural resources and provide you with an enjoyable ride. The **Multi-Use Trail** allows **hikers, bicyclists, and horse-riders to travel together** along designated roads and trails, generally routed around the perimeter of the property and provides a loop between Phillips Landing and Old Sharptown Roads. Trail users should use caution when on the Main Road as it is also open to vehicular traffic.

A. Use of the Multiple Use Trail is subject to the following restrictions:

1. The trail is closed to all non-hunting activities Monday-Saturday from September 1 – February 28 and April 3 – May 8. The trail is open for hiking, bicycling, and horseback riding on Sundays only during these time periods and open seven days a week during the remainder of the year.
2. This area is closed to Sunday firearm deer hunting but is open for Sunday archery and crossbow deer hunting. While not a requirement, trail users are strongly encouraged to wear blaze orange on Sundays during open deer hunting seasons.
3. Riders will confine their travels to the immediate trail and roads open to vehicular traffic, without entering fields, woods, or road edges.
4. **Bicyclists will yield the right of way to horse-riders; horse-riders and bicyclists will yield the right of way to pedestrians using the trail.**
5. Riders will be responsible for keeping the trail clear of trash and fallen limbs, and debris.
6. Horse trailers and vehicles will be parked in such a manner as to not obstruct other vehicular traffic along other roads and maintenance access points.
