1. November 5th CCR Recertification Course

The November 5, 2009 Certification Construction Reviewer (CCR) Recertification course still has seating available. CCR Certification is only good for five years so now is the time to recertify if your certification has expired or will expire in 2009 or 2010. The class will run from 8:30am-4:30pm and you must be present for full duration of course. Registration is required. Enrollment is "first come, first serve", and you will not be guaranteed a seat until your registration form and the fee are received. The registration fee must be paid in advance until the class is full, or by October 29, 2009.

Please be advised that if you do not attend the November 5th course and your certification is up for renewal, you will be required to attend the next 3½-day CCR course (March 2010) and pass the written exam. 2. Attention CCRs: Announcement About Your Certification Number

To all CCRs, please note that your certification number must appear *in full* on all CCR reports. Several years ago, a new numbering system was established for newly certified and recertified CCRs. One example of this numbering system is 2008 03 26 001. This indicates that this individual completed the course on March 26, 2008, and was the first individual within that specific course to be issued a number.

Remember the full certification number must be included on the CCR reports. Proper certification reference is crucial since state and delegated agency inspectors oftentimes need an easy method of determining if a CCRs certification is up-to-date.

3. Seaford Storm Drain Marking in September a Success

There was not a cloud in the sky on this crisp, clear day of September 19th. Volunteers scoured the streets of Seaford marking the storm drains and cleaning out garbage and debris for better street drainage. More than 75 volunteers participated as part of Coastal Clean-up day.
