1 MS. NEWMAN: Good evening. Thank
2 you all for joining tonight. My name is
3 Theresa Newman.

4 I'm going to give a couple of the
5 attendees a few more minutes to join before
6 we begin the hearing.

7 We still have a few that we are
8 waiting on, so about two or three more
9 minutes before we begin. Thank you patiently
10 for waiting.

11 (Recessed from 6:00 p.m. to 6:03 p.m.)

12 MS. NEWMAN: Good evening. I
13 believe everyone is now connected and ready.
14 And so we are going to begin the virtual
15 hearing.

16 Thank you for taking the time out
17 of your busy schedules to connect with us
18 today. The date is Wednesday, October 21,
19 2020.

20 We are here this evening to provide
21 a virtual hearing platform for the State of
22 Delaware's Department of Natural Resources
23 and Environmental Control to conduct a public
24 hearing on Proposed Revisions to 7 DE Admin



1 Code 1301, Section 14, "Plastic Carryout Bag
2 Ban and At-Store Recycling Program."

3 My name is Theresa Newman, and
4 Secretary Garvin has appointed me to serve as
5 the hearing officer for tonight's formal
6 proceeding.

7 There have been changes made to
8 DNREC's standard hearing protocols,
9 necessitated by Delaware's ongoing State of
10 Emergency due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

11 First and foremost, this hearing is
12 being conducted virtually. No one is
13 together in the same room. Everyone is
14 participating independently at their own
15 respective locations.

16 While we are not physically
17 together tonight, WebEx does generate a list
18 of those that are virtually present so the
19 Department will have a record of those who
20 have joined this proceeding. And, again, I
21 want to thank everyone for the interest in
22 this matter.

23 At the conclusion of the
24 introductory remarks, I will be turning



1 the hearing over to the Department staff to
2 provide a presentation for the record being
3 generated in this matter.

4 There is a court reporter virtually
5 present, who will prepare a verbatim
6 transcript of this hearing pursuant to the
7 statutory requirement for DNREC to have the
8 same prepared. And, as always, the
9 transcript will be posted on the hearing
10 web-page dedicated to this matter as soon as
11 it is received.

12 In addition, I would encourage
13 those who are attending tonight's hearing to
14 also visit the hearing web-page dedicated to
15 this matter for additional details concerning
16 the proposed regulatory matter.

17 The hearing web-page can be found
18 under the Administrative Law section of
19 DNREC's website that will be listed at the
20 end of the Department's presentation.

21 It should be noted that the
22 Department offered the ability for members of
23 the public to pre-register in order to offer
24 live comment during tonight's hearing.



1 Once the Department's presentation
2 concludes, those persons who were
3 preregistered in advance of this hearing will
4 be acknowledged and provided an opportunity
5 to offer comment on the proposed regulations,
6 in alignment with DNREC's standard comment
7 protocols.

8 The following protocols remain in
9 place for all DNREC public hearings:

10 All comment received must be
11 limited solely to the subject matter of
12 tonight's hearing. All comments pertinent to
13 the subject matter of the virtual hearing
14 will be incorporated into the record being
15 generated in this matter.

16 In order to ensure that everyone
17 who wishes to offer comment for the
18 Secretary's Consideration is accommodated,
19 the record in this matter shall remain open
20 following tonight's proceeding through
21 November 5, 2020.

22 There is only one authentic record
23 of this formal proceeding tonight, and it is
24 the official court reporter's verbatim



1 transcript.

2 The statutory purpose of tonight's
3 hearing is to build a record with regard to
4 the Department's proposed actions. A record
5 consisting of the transcript of the hearing
6 tonight, all written comments, all exhibits,
7 and eventually the Hearing Officer's Report
8 will be reviewed by Secretary Garvin.

9 The Secretary will ultimately issue
10 an order following that review process,
11 containing his decision on this matter, and
12 the reasons therefor.

13 Per DNREC's standard hearing
14 protocols, there will be no Q and A or chat
15 sessions permitted during this hearing.

16 Those who have pre-registered to
17 offer verbal comment will be acknowledged to
18 speak at the conclusion of the presentation
19 portion of tonight's proceedings. Additional
20 instruction with regard to the offering of
21 verbal comment tonight will be provided at
22 that time.

23 Lastly, it is important to note
24 that no decision has already been made by the



1 Department, nor will any decision be made
2 tonight with regard to the proposed project.

3 As previously said, DNREC wishes to
4 ensure that everyone is enabled to offer
5 their comment for inclusion into the record
6 being generated in this matter. Therefore,
7 the record will remain open through Thursday,
8 November 5, 2020, so that the public may
9 offer written comment, should they wish to do
10 so.

11 Comments may be submitted through a
12 comment form link on the hearing page, via
13 e-mail to DNRECHearingComments@delaware.gov
14 or via the U.S. Postal Service at the
15 physical address for DNREC indicated on the
16 hearing web-page and/or the public notices
17 previously issued in this matter.

18 Written comments to DNREC may not
19 be submitted using social media platforms
20 such as Twitter, Facebook, YouTube or text
21 messaging.

22 Please remember that all comment
23 received, either through USPS or via the
24 electronic mechanisms noted just now, as long



1 as received by the Department on or before
2 November 5th, will bear the exact same weight
3 and will all be considered equally by the
4 Secretary prior to making his final decision
5 in this matter.

6 Lastly, the ultimate decision
7 regarding this matter is made by DNREC
8 Secretary Garvin. This formal hearing
9 tonight acts as a mechanism to enable the
10 Department to thoroughly vet this proposed
11 regulation to the public and to let the
12 public know the various ways through which
13 comment may be submitted for Secretary
14 Garvin's consideration, if so desired.

15 I will now hand it over to Adam
16 Schlachter, with the Division of Waste and
17 Hazardous Substances to provide the
18 Department's presentation. You may go ahead,
19 Adam.

20 MR. SCHLACHTER: Thank you. Can
21 you all see my presentation?

22 MS. NEWMAN: Yes.

23 MR. SCHLACHTER: Excellent. Good
24 evening. My name is Adam Schlachter. And



1 I'm the Program Manager for the Waste
2 Management Reduction Section of DNREC, which
3 is the party ultimately responsible for this
4 program.

5 You can direct any questions
6 regarding administrative matters to me. And
7 also joining this call is Barbara Blair from
8 our office, who is going to be the technical
9 assistant and the person overseeing
10 compliance and enforcement for the
11 regulations.

12 So the statute referenced on this
13 page was updated to reflect Delaware
14 Legislature's changes to the prior version of
15 the law. It was passed by the Legislature in
16 July of 2019.

17 The plastic carryout bag ban is
18 currently set to go into effect on January 1,
19 2021.

20 The regulations that DNREC
21 developed are written to clear up any
22 inconsistency and provide a platform for fair
23 and equitable interpretation of the law,
24 compliance assistance, and monitoring and



1 enforcement.

2 One thing to note, during our
3 review after submission for publishing, we
4 realized that there was an error in the
5 plastic carryout bag definition that we
6 proposed for the regulations, because of
7 other changes that were removed from the
8 proposed regulations.

9 The definition of plastic carryout
10 bag that was originally in the statute is
11 what we will carry forward into the
12 regulations.

13 The Legislature's definition of a
14 store established who would be affected by
15 this law and also established effective date,
16 January 1, 2021, to allow stores sufficient
17 time to adapt.

18 Consistent with the previous
19 version of the law, restaurants are exempt,
20 and can use plastic carryout bags for their
21 to-go orders and do not have to adhere to the
22 other requirements of this law.

23 The definition of a reusable bag
24 was also defined within the update. The bags



1 outlined by this definition can include not
2 only bags made from cotton or plastic
3 fabrics, but also can include film plastic
4 bags, provided they meet the standards
5 outlined. This definition has been added to
6 the regulations directly from the statute.

7 Stores that are covered by this law
8 will continue to need to have an At-Store
9 Recycling Program for film and plastic bags.
10 Due to the fact that Delaware's curbside
11 program cannot accept film or bags, this
12 dropoff opportunity represents a recycling
13 program that Delawareans can utilize.

14 As you can see from the list, the
15 ban only applies to the bag which would be
16 used to carry items out of the store or what
17 we refer to as the plastic carryout bag.

18 There will still be plastic bags
19 available to our residents and within our
20 stores.

21 Additionally, as discussed earlier
22 in the presentation, a thicker version of the
23 traditional carryout bag can be distributed
24 as long as it meets the reusable bag



1 requirements outlined in the law.

2 In order to preserve the
3 availability of the dropoff program for
4 Delawareans, stores that continue to
5 distribute any plastic carryout bags, exempt
6 or not, will be required to have an at-store
7 recycling program.

8 Any store that eliminates all of
9 the plastic bags, exempt and non-exempt, will
10 not need to have an at-store recycling
11 program. Stores have until March 31st of
12 2021 to make this decision.

13 DNREC encourages retailers to work
14 with their bag manufacturers to make sure
15 that the bags are recyclable in the existing
16 film and bag recycling programs currently
17 servicing the state.

18 Additionally, as new opportunities
19 are developed, we encourage manufacturers to
20 consider partnering with those markets to
21 close the loop and support the program by
22 manufacturing bags from recycled content
23 resin provided by the film and bag recycling
24 program.



1 The language above allows
2 Wilmington to make changes to this law within
3 the city by an action of the Wilmington City
4 Council. So far, this has not happened.

5 The regulations were designed to
6 support the plastic carryout bag ban
7 as well as reinforce the At-Store Recycling
8 Program.

9 Additionally, they were set up to
10 make sure that all the material collected was
11 kept separate and sent to a legitimate
12 recycling market and not just put into the
13 trash.

14 Finally, we require that the
15 material be tracked and reported so that we,
16 DNREC, can quantify the impact of this
17 legislation to the Delaware General Assembly
18 for their input.

19 The goal with this was not only to
20 encourage the stores in Delaware, but also to
21 include the manufacturing community. By
22 leveraging the connection between a recycling
23 program and the marketplace, the hope is that
24 the manufacturing community has a new, ready



1 source of raw material for items that they
2 sell back to the stores.

3 Again, the goal in adding the
4 definition of "marketplace" to the
5 regulations allows DNREC to make sure that
6 separated recycling goes to an entity that
7 can process it, move it to a manufacturing
8 opportunity, and make sure it gets recycled.

9 This allows us to ensure that when
10 residents recycle their plastic bags at these
11 locations, that stores are not just putting
12 the material into the trash or recycling
13 dumpster where it will be thrown away.

14 Paper bags are an acceptable
15 alternative to replace single-use carryout
16 bags. This definition was designed to lessen
17 the impacts of these bags on the environment
18 by putting in place some parameters for their
19 manufacturers.

20 The "retail space" definition is
21 important so DNREC can accurately determine
22 which stores are regulated and which are not.
23 This definition helps make the implementation
24 of the statute fair and equitable to all the



1 stores within Delaware.

2 Because there was some confusion by
3 the retail industry about who was or was not
4 impacted by the law change, DNREC also
5 modified the definition of a store to be more
6 clear.

7 The exemption in the statute is for
8 restaurants that have to-go services. The
9 Delaware Department of Finance, Division of
10 Revenue, issues business licenses to all
11 entities within Delaware that operate as a
12 business.

13 These are done by a specific
14 category list. In keeping with the intent of
15 the law, any store that carries only the
16 retailer-restaurant business activity license
17 continues to remain exempt.

18 If a store carries multiple
19 business activity licenses, one of which is
20 retail or gas restaurant, they are not
21 considered exempt from these regulations and
22 must participate.

23 Under the current terms of the
24 statute and the regulations, the stores that



1 fit the definition of "store" based on their
2 retail space must participate in the At-Store
3 Recycling Program, which is the second part
4 of the law.

5 Through their participation in this
6 program, Delawareans continue to have a way
7 to recycle plastic bags and film, and the
8 program is more consistent across the state.

9 As stated previously, stores that
10 eliminate all bags, exempt and non-exempt, do
11 not need to participate in the At-Store
12 Recycling Program.

13 Finally, the measurement piece, as
14 discussed before, is critical in making sure
15 that the Legislature knows that this program
16 is effective and supports the broader
17 diversion efforts they have directed DNREC to
18 support on their behalf.

19 If a retailer in the state does not
20 meet the definition of a store but wants to
21 eliminate plastic carryout bags and/or have
22 an At-Store Recycling Program, they are
23 encouraged to do so. While they do not need
24 to, there is nothing that prohibits them from



1 doing so.

2 Finally, as mentioned previously,
3 the goal of any recycling program is to
4 connect to the manufacturers who need the
5 material to the marketplace that can provide
6 it. DNREC encourages plastic bag
7 manufacturers to work with the stores covered
8 by this law to help them adopt programs which
9 are successful and sustainable.

10 And, as mentioned before, my name
11 is Adam. I am the program manager for this
12 program, and will be available for
13 administrative questions.

14 And Barbara Blair is our technical
15 assistant and compliance staff member. Thank
16 you very much.

17 MS. NEWMAN: Adam, before you
18 complete your presentation, I believe there
19 is exhibits that you would like to provide;
20 is that correct?

21 MR. SCHLACHTER: Sure.

22 MS. NEWMAN: Okay. If you could,
23 you don't have to go through a full detail,
24 because those will be posted online, but if



1 you could just give a summary of the exhibits
2 that you would like to enter into the record.

3 MR. SCHLACHTER: Sure. Let me pull
4 up my list in my e-mail, if you all don't
5 mind.

6 MS. NEWMAN: We don't necessarily
7 need a visual, Adam. If you wanted to just
8 go over them. Yeah, that's fine.

9 MR. SCHLACHTER: I didn't have the
10 list memorized. Bear with me.

11 MS. NEWMAN: It's a long list.

12 MR. SCHLACHTER: It is. (Laughter)
13 All right.

14 So the exhibits that we are going
15 to enter into the record include Delaware's
16 Register of Regulations, Volume 24, Issue 4,
17 which was published on October 1 of 2020 that
18 identifies the proposed regulations and
19 provides the notice of this public hearing.

20 Exhibit 2 is going to be a PDF copy
21 of the virtual public workshop presentation
22 that DNREC did in September.

23 Exhibit 3 is the State Public
24 Meeting Calendar notification.



1 Exhibit 4 is going to be the DNREC
2 Public Meeting Calendar notification.

3 Exhibit 5 is the affidavit from the
4 State News for legal notice of this hearing.

5 Exhibit 6 is going to be the
6 affidavit from the News Journal of this
7 public hearing notification.

8 Exhibit 7 will be a copy of the
9 presentation that you just saw on the screen
10 in PDF.

11 Exhibit 8 is going to be the
12 identified corrections that we made to the
13 proposed regulations published in the
14 Delaware Register of Regulations, Volume 24,
15 Issue 4.

16 Exhibit 9 is a copy of House Bill
17 130, which is the legislation that or the
18 bill that changed the current legislation to
19 be what it is now.

20 Exhibit 10 is the written comments
21 that we have received prior to this hearing.

22 And then Exhibit 11 is going to be
23 a link to 7 Del Code 6099(a), which is the
24 actual legislation.



1 MS. NEWMAN: Okay. I have
2 electronically received your exhibits
3 Mr. Schlachter, and I do hereby mark the
4 exhibits that were proposed as Department's
5 Exhibits 1 through 11. Does that conclude
6 your presentation for tonight?

7 MR. SCHLACHTER: It does.

8 MS. NEWMAN: Wonderful. Thank you,
9 Mr. Schlachter. We are going to move forward
10 to comments. Bear with me.

11 Okay. All right. Now that the
12 Department's presentation has concluded, we
13 are going to turn attention to those who have
14 preregistered for the opportunity to offer
15 verbal comment at tonight's hearing.

16 Per the protocol set forth on
17 DNREC's public hearing web-page, those
18 wishing to offer verbal comments during the
19 virtual hearing must have preregistered with
20 DNREC no later than noon on the day of the
21 hearing.

22 The orders of those comments here
23 tonight was established as a result of the
24 Department's preregistration process.



1 The order of commenters will begin
2 with Mr. Crouse. Second will be Ms. Wenger,
3 and lastly is Ms. Knearl. All commenters
4 must adhere to the Department's protocols
5 with regard to offering verbal comment,
6 including making their comments as concise as
7 possible, respecting the time limit of three
8 minutes, and limiting their comments to the
9 subject matter of this hearing.

10 To assist the commenter with regard
11 to the amount of time they have, there is a
12 visual timer that has appeared on the screen
13 to count down the three minutes.

14 When it is the speaker's turn to
15 comment, the speaker's audio will be
16 un-muted, their identity will be confirmed,
17 and the timer will begin.

18 At the end of the three minutes,
19 the speaker's audio will automatically be
20 placed back on mute, and we will move on to
21 the next person to be acknowledged to offer
22 comment.

23 Please note that there is no live
24 video feed of the commenter, and they will be



1 by audio only.

2 All commenters -- or all comments
3 will be transcribed by the court reporter and
4 thereby incorporated into the record.

5 If the speaker is not able to
6 finish their comment within the three-minute
7 time period, the Department encourages them
8 to submit their completed comments in writing
9 no later than November 5th. No commenter
10 will be granted more than three minutes of
11 time to speak for any reason.

12 With that being said, we will begin
13 the public comment portion of the hearing.

14 Do we have Mr. Crouse available?
15 Again, I will call one more time. I don't
16 see Mr. Crouse on the attendee list. Give me
17 one moment while I look through the list
18 again.

19 For the record, I just want to make
20 the public aware that Mr. Crouse did register
21 to provide a public comment. However, he is
22 not an attendee as per the WebEx list of
23 attendees. So we are going to move on to the
24 next speaker.



1 We have Julie Wenger. Julie
2 Wanger, are you available? Julie?

3 MR. SCHLACHTER: Is it possible she
4 is muted on her end, Theresa?

5 MS. NEWMAN: I did un-mute her. I
6 do see a member that there is issues with the
7 call-in portion. I do have her attending.
8 Let me -- I'm going to try to make her a
9 panelist to see if we can get her up on the
10 call. One second. Julie?

11 Let me try this one. Julie? Hmm.
12 Okay. I'm going to move ahead. Julie, we
13 will come back to you. I do see that you are
14 logged in. However, it's not allowing -- I
15 guess you may not have audio set up to
16 provide a verbal comment. I'm unsure why you
17 are not able to connect in.

18 We have two connections with you,
19 one call-in and one video. So I'm going to
20 place you on mute for now. And then we will
21 try back around to see if you are able to
22 provide that comment.

23 We have Emily Knearl. Emily?

24 MS. KNEARL: Yes, I'm here.



1 MS. NEWMAN: Wonderful. Thank you
2 so much, Ms. Knearl. You may go ahead and
3 provide your comment.

4 MS. KNEARL: All right. Thank you
5 so much. My name is Emily Knearl. I'm from
6 the Delaware Nature Society.

7 One of the things I would like to
8 say for the record is that, if I'm doing my
9 math correctly, witnesses are outweighing you
10 guys -- you guys are outweighing us two to
11 one.

12 And I'm recognizing there are
13 potentially four DNREC staffers that are part
14 of this hearing for only one to two, maybe
15 three witnesses. That doesn't mean this
16 isn't important.

17 And on behalf of Delaware Nature
18 Society and our 13,000 constituents, thank
19 you for tonight, and thank you for working
20 late.

21 I am going to say some things for
22 the record that will sound repetitive, but
23 Delaware Nature Society wanted to get it into
24 the record.



1 We have been around since the mid
2 sixties, and we do advocacy conservation and
3 education that is about protecting and
4 honoring the natural world.

5 A few things about plastic bags
6 that it never hurts to reiterate: Again,
7 some of this, for some of you, this will be
8 repetitive.

9 Almost 2,000 plastic bags were
10 collected in Delaware's coastal beaches in a
11 national cleanup a couple years ago.

12 Estimates are that less than 10
13 percent of plastic carryout bags are recycled
14 and that these bags, as you guys know, or
15 many of you know, is often very difficult to
16 recycle.

17 Single-use plastic bags, in a word,
18 poison our water, our wildlife, and our
19 waterways.

20 What we also wanted to make sure
21 that we expressed today is that it is very
22 important that COVID not be seen as a reason
23 not to proceed with the regulations or the
24 timeline laid out by the State Legislature.



1 I know DNREC's hands are tied, but
2 we also wanted to get on record as saying
3 that there has been a lot of inaccurate
4 information about COVID and single-use
5 plastics, including by some in the plastic
6 industry that are not consistent with the
7 science.

8 In an article in June of this year,
9 the National Institute of Health published an
10 article questioning several of the plastic
11 industry's conclusions, including studies
12 that have been used to justify using more
13 single-use plastic bags when, in fact, the
14 data that the plastic industry has been using
15 and that has been cited is for entirely
16 different diseases that have transmission
17 vectors that are fundamentally different from
18 COVID.

19 So we think it's very important
20 that it be known and well known that COVID is
21 not going to be transmitted through plastic,
22 single-use plastic bags --

23 Single-use plastic bags are not
24 going to prevent the transmission of COVID.



1 Sorry. Let me restate that. And reusable
2 backs are not a vector. They have not been
3 proven a vector. And that's very important.

4 A couple pieces specific related to
5 the regulations themselves: The regulations
6 talk about resin. And one of the most
7 important factors to any plastic film bag
8 recycling program is that there is an
9 assurance that there will be a recycling
10 market for the plastic film, itself.

11 Recycling programs rely heavily on
12 the market demand for products made from
13 recyclable materials, whether there be more
14 film bags or other products.

15 While the regulations are designed
16 to increase the amount of plastic film going
17 into recycling programs, it's not necessarily
18 creating an incentive for businesses or
19 manufacturers to purchase or produce products
20 made from recycled plastic resin content.

21 Delaware Nature Society is asking
22 tonight that the regulations be very
23 aggressive in this piece, and the ask is that
24 25 percent recycled resin content be required



1 for reusable plastic bags by 2022. I
2 recognize that is pretty aggressive. Related
3 to -- am I out of time?

4 MS. NEWMAN: Yes. I'm sorry. The
5 timer on my end didn't show up. I believe,
6 yes, we have surpassed the three-minute time
7 mark. I'm sorry.

8 MS. KNEARL: Okay. I have
9 additional comments. But I'm sorry. I
10 didn't get a timer showing up when I was
11 talking.

12 I'm happy. I'm all for following
13 the rules. We are going to submit additional
14 comments. I can hold my further comments
15 going forward.

16 One more thing: I want to thank
17 Adam Schlachter. He has put a lot of hard
18 work in this and a lot of hard work into the
19 regs.

20 And I really, really appreciate his
21 accessibility, his willingness to have
22 conversation, and his commitment.

23 MS. NEWMAN: Thank you.

24 MS. KNEARL: Sure.



1 MS. NEWMAN: Before we conclude
2 tonight, I'm going to attempt to get Julie
3 back on the line. So if everyone who is
4 currently attending could bear with me so we
5 could try to get her back on line to provide
6 her comment.

7 Okay. Thank you all for patiently
8 waiting. I did receive an e-mail from
9 Ms. Wanger. She is going to submit a written
10 comment for the record.

11 And, as anyone else who would like
